PA State Representative Marcia Hahn of the 138th district is set to support legislation which would increase the amount of tax money eligible to provide scholarships through the "Opportunity Scholarship ... Tax Credit" to private and religious schools. This legislation takes desperately needed public taxpayer funds away from public schools and sends it directly to private schools. It is unconstitutional for the state to send the money directly to private schools. Please call Marcia Hahn at 610.746.2100 (local office) or 717.783.8573 (Harrisburg office) and tell her to vote "NO" on HB 250. Facing a deficit of \$3 billion, HB 250 would divert another \$75 million of tax payer money to unaccountable private and religious schools. Even if you do not live in the 138th district please call as this bill covers the entire commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

The PA Senate voted today on an amendment to SB 383, a bill that would allow school personnel (teachers, cafeteria workers, janitors, etc., not trained School Resource Officers) to carry guns in schools, with NO requirement for secure storage and vague, ill-defined training requirements. Lehigh Valley Senators Pat Browne and Lisa Boscola both voted for this amendment, which indicates they are likely to vote for the amended bill when it goes for a full floor vote (likely tomorrow or Wednesday). PA Peeps CALL YOUR STATE SENATOR TOMORROW MORNING and tell them to vote NO on SB 383. Boscola and Browne's numbers below.

Dear BASD Parents.

Over the past couple of months, at PTA meetings, school events, and while we wait to pick up our children, a growing number of parents have been having informal conversations about potential changes to school funding that are being considered in the state legislature in Harrisburg. In fact, a couple of pieces of legislation that our state senators and house members are discussing right now will have a serious impact on our schools if they are enacted. Details of some of the most time-sensitive issues are attached.

Recognizing that parents' views should be part of any state-level discussions about changes to school funding structures, a few of us began to explore ways for concerned BASD parents to make our voices heard. There is no one-size-fits all model for doing this. We are writing now to create a space for us to share timely information about legislation and to generate ideas about ways we can reach out to elected officials ourselves and to help empower more parents to raise our voices and let legislators know what we are thinking.

This is our first effort to pass information along the parent pipeline. We hope that it enables parents/lead advocates at each school to engage as they feel is best. For those who are open to making phone calls to our state senators and house members, we offer some potential talking points. For others who might be interested in meeting with members of the PA General Assembly in their district offices, we can brainstorm on ways to do that most effectively. And for those who feel most comfortable making their views heard in writing, we have some potential scripts and ideas for encouraging post-card writing. We also encourage anyone who has ideas for reaching out to our legislators shares ideas. Time is of the essence and these important discussions about the future of our children's education need to include our views.

A few more items.



RESOLUTION OPPOSING ESA VOUCHER PROGRAMS (SB 2) BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE BETHLEHEM AREA SCHOOL DISTRICT

WHEREAS, Pennsylvania school districts provide countless academic and extracurricular opportunities for learning and growth of all students, preparing them for higher education and careers; and districts have continued to make steady gains in academic achievement, with Pennsylvania students consistently ranked in or near the top 10 nationally on the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) exams for reading and math; and Pennsylvania has been named a national leader in providing Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) education programs; and

WHEREAS, Pennsylvania also maintains a greater high school graduation rate and a larger percentage of students moving on to higher education than the national average; and

WHEREAS, more than 80% of Pennsylvania students enrolled in career and technical centers or programs are achieving at the competent or advanced level on industry-based skills assessments, enabling them to earn credentials leading to meaningful employment or college credit equivalencies at cooperating institutions; and

WHEREAS, public schools ensure that each student with a disability receives a Free Appropriate Public Education (FAPE) in compliance with federal and state law and regulations, with students and their families having the benefits of a system of procedural safeguards; and

WHEREAS, Education Savings Account (ESA) voucher programs such as those under Senate Bill 2 undermine Pennsylvania's responsibility to ensure every student in every community has equal access to public education; and schools targeted under Senate Bill 2 are already in under-resourced districts; and state money for ESAs would be deducted, on a per-student basis, from a school district's basic education subsidy; and not only would school districts' state aid be sent to unaccountable private schools, but such money could also be diverted to higher education, tutoring services and other "qualified education expenses," not even ensuring students receive full-time educational instruction; and

WHEREAS, the voucher program in Senate Bill 2 benefits families regardless of income or need, including students already enrolled in private schools or never having attended a targeted public school; and voucher systems in other states have been shown to be vulnerable to financial fraud and abuse; and

WHEREAS, unlike private schools, public school districts accept, educate and protect the rights of all children who come to their doors, as opposed to those institutions that can reject applicants based on any number of factors and are not required to uphold the rights of students with disabilities; and

WHEREAS, public schools are held to strict accountability standards that measure student achievement and academic progress, unlike private schools which are not required to use the same standard assessments and reporting requirements as public schools; and provisions under Senate Bill 2 would not require participating private schools to use the same standardized assessments, making comparison and evaluation of academic progress unachievable; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Bethlehem Area School District opposes Senate Bill 2 and any other legislation or any effort by the General Assembly to implement tuition vouchers or any other program that would have an effect of a tuition voucher program, and conveys the importance of supporting and improving the quality of all public schools in the Commonwealth.

Julie Gallagher and Karen Beck Pooley: School voucher legislation would divert needed funds from public schools

e are deeply disappointed to learn that the state Senate Education Committee is again giving serious consideration to Senate Bill 2. Although named the "Education Savings Account Act," this bill stands to create vouchers that will drain essential resources from public school districts across the state and transfer those dollars to private schools.

The bill explicitly states that a district's basic education funding and other state subsidies "shall be reduced by the grant amount calculated for [each] student" receiving a voucher. This could mean a significant loss of funds for public schools. Adding insult to injury, the bill proposes that private contractors be hired to manage the voucher program, and, even worse, stipulates that state and local school boards will have no right to regulate the private schools teaching students supported by public tax dollars.

As engaged citizens, as property-owning taxpayers, and, most importantly, as proud parents of children in the Bethlehem Area School District, we strongly oppose this bill. If SB2 passes, it will undermine our children's educational opportunities and devastatingly compromise Bethlehem's notable successes.

As an example of the kind of damage SB2 could do, estimates show that Bethlehem schools will lose a budget-busting \$14.7 million — if just one-third of eligible students request and receive vouchers. To put that number in context, \$14.7 million is roughly 3 1/2 times what the district plans to spend on its highly successful Reading By Grade 3 initiative and over 30 times what it plans to spend updating its middle school curriculum.

In order to write about the many reasons that I love Thomas Jefferson Elementary School (TJ) I took a moment to stop and think about what makes a great school and what are the things that provide a student with an excellent education. There are indeed many pieces that need to work cohesively in order to provide a student with a stellar education and at the elementary level to provide them with the foundation for a lifetime of learning. One needs to take into consideration what it is that encourages a child to learn and excel, to exceed even his or her own expectations. How does a child learn that education is and should be a continuing journey, one that will open his or her mind and doors in the future? Again, many pieces need to come together to help an elementary student recognize and embrace the importance of education. These goals are supported by many of the same things. Some of these are basic human needs; a warm and clean place to learn, nutrition, care for the mind and body. A child needs to have trust for those providing the education and care. A child needs to accept that those providing the education are doing so out of a belief that every child has an inherent right to an education and more so that these children deserve that education. They need the tools of education; books, technology and patience. They need the adults and those in the position of leadership around them to know who they are as people and what their names. At TJ all of the staff knows all of the students' names. The teachers don't just know their students. They know the students in the other grade, both those they have taught and not yet had a change to teach. This in turn, means that the students also know the other students outside of their class whether it is because they have overlapping lunch or recess time or maybe from one of the many outstanding after-school opportunities. TJ is somewhat unique in the open school concept (minimal walls) but I have seen firsthand how it enables the students and teachers to know the whole school. How TJ's students are proficient at focusing and dealing with distractions. Hove that my kids can see each other during the day as they enjoy that and I think it provides a sense of comfort for them. Mrs. Hirner (TJ's Principal) is outside every morning and every afternoon. She greets every child she sees with a smile of encouragement and joy. She greets the parent or guardian (sibling...) that is dropping off the child. She knows what is going on with the students, which child may need a bit more encouragement today and which child just wants a high five or some acknowledgment. This is more than feeling welcomed and more than feeling wanted and believed in. It provides the students with a

daily reminder that she has their back and she will hold them to their best but will be there when they
